Look closely at the fountain, what kind of animal do you see on the inside?


Inside the park there is lots to see and do, including ponds, a playground and the beautiful Saracen Fountain which is over 12 metres tall!

Stop 2 DENNISTOUN LIBRARY

(Category B-listed)

The Library opened in 1905. It is called a Carnegie Library because it was built using money donated by Andrew Carnegie, a man born in Scotland who moved to America and became one of the richest people who ever lived. He donated money to build over 2000 libraries across the world. The Dennistoun Library has a special statue which is called the "Dennistoun Angel". Can you find it?



Stop 3 THE LADY WELL



The Lady Well is on the site of an ancient well that provided water for the people of Glasgow before it was common to have running water inside your home.

Stop @ BUFFALO BILL

In 1891 Buffalo Bill, One of the most famous and well known figures of the American Old West, brought his "Wild West Show" to the very spot where his statue is today. It ran for three months and showed cowboy themes, reenactments of battles, horsemanships and shooting.

Stop 6 WELLPARK BREWERY

Wellpark Brewery was first known as the Drygate Brewery, a brewery is a place where beer is made. It was founded in 1740 by Hugh and Robert Tennent but brewing had taken place at the same site on the banks of the Molendinar Burn by their ancestor, Robert Tennent, since 1556, more than 450 years ago!

Have a look at the beautiful murals on the wall, which one is your favourite?




Stop 6 NECROPOLIS

(Category A-listed)



Glasgow Necropolis was the first garden cemetery in Scotland. It was built in the Victorian period when Glasgow was a very rich and important city, second only to London. There are almost 50.000 people buried in the Necropolis

including merchants, architects, ship builders and soldiers. As well as the beautiful monuments and gravestones, there are also 180 species of flowering plants and trees! What are you waiting for? Go explore!



Stop CATHEDRAL

(Category A-listed)

Glasgow Cathedral is one of the oldest buildings in Glasgow and the only mediaeval cathedral in Scotland. It is located where the patron saint of Glasgow, Saint Mungo, first built his church. Once inside, you can visit Saint Mungo's tomb in the lower church and don't forget to stop to observe the beautiful stained glass windows. Look out for the old organ, a large musical instrument with a keyboard and pipes!
